The Camellias are really putting on a show this month. One of mine is complaining about getting a lot more sun, but they usually adjust to this over



time. Snaps and pansies are blooming happily along with winter azaleas, and our ryegrass is making us more cheerful in lawns that were torn up by bobcats after the storm. December's late freeze didn't do much damage except to my gingers which were sprouting after being obliterated by the aforementioned machines. Let's hope this doesn't discourage them too much.

Now is a good time to read garden catalogs or go online to plan beds and order new plants and seeds. Clean up flowerbeds in this balmy weather and dig in compost or commercial soil additives. Finish planting bulbs for spring bloom and mark them with golf tees to avoid disturbing them when you plant annuals over them later. If squirrels are a problem, sprinkle area with red pepper.

Some tall shrubs that are deer resistant and grow rapidly are Cherry Laurel, Clumping Bamboo, Bottlebrush and Oleander. River Birch trees with multiple stems are worth the expense, and some other shrubs you must try are Pineapple Guava, Burford Holly and <u>Tea Olive</u>. My Tea Olives have been blooming for over a month – filling the whole area with their delightful scent.

MARINATED SHRIMP-AND-ARTICHOKES 8 Servings

1/4 cup white balsamic vinegar

2 tablespoons finely chopped fresh parsley

2 tablespoons finely chopped green onion

3 tablespoons olive oil



1 (0.75-oz.) envelope garlic-and-herb dressing mix (Good Seasons used)

1 pound peeled and deveined, large cooked shrimp (21/30 count)

1 (14-oz.) can artichoke hearts, drained and cut in half

1 (6-oz.) can large black olives, drained

1 cup halved grape tomatoes

1 (4-oz.) package feta cheese, cut into 1/2-inch cubes

Small fresh basil leaves

Optional additions, roasted red bell peppers, marinated sun dried tomatoes, kalamata olives

Preparation

1. Whisk together balsamic vinegar and next 4 ingredients in a bowl. Stir in shrimp and next 4 ingredients. Cover and chill 8 to 24 hours.

2. Stir in desired amount of basil just before serving. Serve with a slotted spoon For those with shrimp allergies, just leave out the shrimp, still really good Description:

"Serve as heavy hors d'oeuvres or as a light holiday supper all season long"

Changes to the Bylaws have been proposed by the Bylaw Committee and approved by the Board. The current wording to be changed is underlined. The proposed wording is in red font. In compliance with Article IX, Section 1 this notice is being given to each member at least 2 weeks prior to a vote being taken. The vote will take place at the February General meeting. If passed, these changes will go into effect for the new term starting in September.

• Article III Membership, Section 1: This club will be limited to seventy five (75) Active members and to no more than five (5) Associate members.

This club will be limited to seventy-five (75) Active members and to no more than ten (10) honorary members

• Article III Membership, Section 5: Honorary membership will be conferred by a majority of the <u>members</u> upon the recommendation of the Executive Committee.

Honorary membership will be conferred by a majority of the <u>Board</u> upon the recommendation of the Executive Committee.

• Article IV Officers and Organization, Section 1: The Officers include: President, First Vice-President, Second Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer. <u>The term of office</u> for the Treasurer will be two (2) years; the term of office for the other Officers will be one (1) year. No Officer may serve more than two (2) consecutive terms.

The term for all officers will be for two (2) years and no officer may serve more than two (2) consecutive terms in the same office.

• Article IV Officers and Organization, Section 4 part M: <u>PARLIAMENTARIAN:</u> <u>Advises the membership on parliamentary rules and procedures.</u>

The office of Parliamentarian will be fulfilled by the immediate past President.

• Article IV Officers and Organization, Section 4, part Q: <u>TELEPHONE: Notifies the</u> <u>membership of meetings, meeting changes and other timely information as needed.</u>
