



HURRICANES...

We've experienced the destructive force of nature and lived through the aftermath of Matthew. We saw what hurricane force winds did to our beautiful island. The surprise was how fast the beauty of nature that Hilton Head is famous for, returned...in a relatively short time, the damage was cleared away and things were lush and green again.

In November, 6 weeks after Category 5 Hurricane Maria, I flew into San Juan Puerto Rico and then on to the The British Virgin Islands. As horrifying as Mathew had been for us, the aftermath of a Category 5 is truly indescribable. I had seen the reports and photos on the news, but it did not prepare me for actually being there. I think it is because the news is showing you one view... when you're there, the view is panoramic... destruction everywhere you look. There was an entire block of thousands of totaled cars. The cars that survived and were providing transportation, had no windows because it's an island and new windows were unavailable. Coves and marinas, 6 weeks out, were still littered with thousands of destroyed boats. It was reported that everything was defoliated. It was more than that. Not only were the leaves gone, but also most of the branches. But here is where I saw the remarkable ability of Nature to come back. These large trees, reduced to a trunk and a few main branches, looked like they were wearing green sweaters. Leaves were sprouting everywhere up and down the trunks. Every once in a while, miraculously, a surviving hibiscus was blooming amidst the rubble...a symbol of hope!

Our tour company was the only one that had resumed operations. Imagine...only 4 catamarans sailing the British Virgin Islands! We had it all to ourselves...every cove...every popular tourist destination. We experienced the unique natural beauty the BVI is famous for without thousands of other tourists. When I dived, I was relieved to see that for the most part, the coral reefs weathered the storm well.

It turned out to be the trip of a lifetime with my husband and daughters. We agonized over the decision, but decided to go for it. These Islands need tourism and they are working hard to rebuild and welcome us back... hopefully, it wont be long. Caroline

Camellias are loaded with blooms this year. Not too much damage from the cold.

This is the month to prune anything that does not bloom in Spring. You may take out a third of the shrub each year if needed. Don't flattop anything. Pampas grass only needs cutting back every third year. Plant roses and prune and feed the old ones now. Begin fertilizing everything paying close attention to type and amount to use. Use dormant oil with an insecticide where needed for scale.

Transplant new annuals such as Larkspur as they appear in your garden. Divide perennials.



FEBRUARY'S HEALTHY RECIPES from Anna Broecker

CHOCOLATE BARK, DARK, WITH GOGI BERRIES AND PISTACHIOS

- 1 3.5 to 4 oz dark chocolate bar (70%), broken into pieces
- cup dark chocolate chips (minimum 65%) gogi berries, dried pistachios, raw, hulled, chopped
 - optional toppings; roasted/salted pistachios, dried cherries, dried cranberries, cacao nibs, hemp seeds, chia seeds, pumpkin seeds, etc

In double boiler, melt together dark chocolate bar and dark chocolate chips. Stir until creamy

and smooth with no un-melted chocolate pieces

Line baking tray with parchment paper. Pour melted chocolate over parchment paper and

spread evenly with spatula. Sprinkle gogi berries and chopped pistachios evenly over top of

chocolate. Add other toppings as desired.

Place tray in freezer and chill for at least 15 minutes to allow bark to harden. You may also

chill in the fridge for 1 hour. Break or cut into desired pieces.

Makes 1 large baking sheet of dark chocolate bark

Another sinfully delicious and healthy dessert!

FRUIT AND NUT CHOCOLATE CLUSTERS

- cups semisweet chocolate chips(to make it vegan use dairy free chocolate chips)
- 3/4 cup chopped salted nuts (peanuts, cashews, pistachios, or a combination)
- 1 cup dried fruit (cranberries, cherries, sliced apricots, sliced mango, finely diced pineapple or a combination)

Melt the chocolate chips in the top of a double boiler. Remove from the heat and stir in

the nuts and fruits. Allow the mixture to stand for 5 minutes or so.

Scoop the mixture out by heaping tablespoons and drop onto parchment or wax paper lined plates.

Refrigerate for at least two hours, then remove the parchment, arrange on plates and serve.
