Horticulture......Diane Middleton

Azaleas are blooming like mad along with camellias and Carolina jessamine trailing high into my hedgerow and up to the top of a tall magnolia that was started from a seed scattered about 20 years ago. Spirea and forsythia are blooming heavily – no doubt appreciative of more sun since some large pines in the back came down during Hurricane Matthew.



The last frost date fell on Thursday of this week, but we expect nights in the 30's until then. Virtually all plants except my Tibouchina Tree came back from the freezing temperatures in January. Dutch Iris are beautiful at the farm.

Continue dividing perennials to share with friends. I have plenty of shasta daisies and bearded iris if you want any. Just call my cell at 843-384-0794. Plant summer flowering bulbs including glads every two weeks for continuous bloom. Use new soil for planting pots. Try to find soil that does not contain fertilizer for planting herbs as they taste better in leaner conditions. Use only palm fertilizer on sagos, and watch for scale.

Healthy Eating......Anna Broecker

KUNG PAO LENTILS WITH CASHEWS, BELL PEPPERS AND CELERY

<u>Lentils</u>

- 1/2 cup dry brown lentils, washed and drained
- 1 1/2 cups water

salt, generous pinch or to taste

<u>Sauce</u>

- 3 tablespoons soy sauce
- 2 tablespoons rice wine vinegar
- 1 tablespoon dry sherry or rice wine
- 1 teaspoon hoisin sauce
- 2 tablespoons maple syrup
- 1/4 teaspoon lime zest
- 2 teaspoons corn starch
- 3 tablespoons water

Vegetables

- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 3 tablespoons cashews or peanuts
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 inch knob of ginger minced
- 1 red bell pepperchopped
- 1 green bell pepper chopped
- 3/4 cup chopped celery

lemon juice and black pepper for garnish

Combine lentils, water and salt in a saucepan. Cover and bring to a boil over med high heat about 6 minutes. Reduce heat to med and cook for 20 to 25 minutes more or until the lentils are tender to preference. Let the lentils sit for 5 minutes before using. Drain excess water if needed and keep aside. Or use 1 1/4 cup cooked lentils, chickpeas or beans.

Make sauce: combine all the sauce ingredients into a bowl. Mix well to combine and set aside.

Cook the veggies: Heat a skillet over med hi heat. When the skillet is hot. add onion and cook for 3 minutes. Add the cashews and mix for a few seconds. Add garlic and ginger and mix in. Add the peppers and celery and mix well. Cook for 3 to 4 minutes.

Add in sauce and cooked lentils and mix well. Add some more water if you like extra sauce. Reduce heat to low and cook for 3 to 4 minutes or until the sauce thickend and some is absorbed by the lentils. Taste and adjust spice and sweet. Garnish with a dash of lemon juice and black pepper. Serve with cooked rice or grains.

The Jr. Gardener Club started up again this year in early March, with the students planting tomatoes, kale, cucumbers, radishes and lettuce.

The students meet every Tuesday and Thursday afternoon at 2:30 pm for an hour with Avid Gardeners volunteers Nadine Korosi, Sandy Stern, teacher, Ms. Jackson and parent volunteer, Beth Cooler.





During this time, they weeded 4 raised beds, tilled the soil, fertilized, plant-

ed seeds and 32 starter plants and watered them all. They continue to compost garden waste and other material from home.

While working in the garden, one third grade student commented, "I have many good memories from being in garden club."

This is what it's all about - developing a love of gardening at an early age.
