HORTICULTURE ... Diane Middleton, Master Gardener

Well, rats. We needed the rain. Maybe we will get a few much-needed drops this week. It is still ovenlike outside, but the Beautyberries and gingers are colorful, and I noticed some rain lilies blooming in a good bit of shade. I need to order more, and if any of you want some, just give me a call and I will add your name to my list.

Speaking of lists, here are some of my favorite daffodils for the South. The big box stores carry some of them at fair prices now which is why The Council no longer sells them. Ice Follies, Carlton, Pink Charm, Saint Keverne, Rijnveld's Early Sensation, Thalia, February Gold and Kedron. DO NOT REFRIGERATE any of these. You may refrigerate gregii tulips and hyacinths, but don't put them near any fruit you are cooling or they will not bloom properly.

The Mexican Sage is lovely and lush this year. It seems to prefer dry conditions. When we returned from Maine on September 1st, the white plumes of the pampas grass were already lighting up my back yard.

Some things to do this month include starting seeds of cleome, bachelor buttons, marigold and dianthus. I will also try some hollyhocks when it cools off a little. Other garden chores to do this month are taking cuttings of coleus and other annuals and dividing bearded iris. Trim the roots and let them dry in the sun for a few days. Cut off any with borers (little round holes).

SEX IN THE GARDEN

Did you go into a tither when your biology teacher explained fertilization of plants? How the female flowers must be fertilized by the males? Did you understand the connection of flowers to humans? Do you realize how "sex" is carried on openly right here on Harrogate's grounds?

With the growth of a single pumpkin last year, the prospect of home baked zucchini bread encouraged me to plant zucchini this season. Anxious to get started, because of a late planting season I became creative and started seeds in a Harrogate plastic food delivery container. With the cover down, seedlings sprouted within a week. When they were strong and weather conditions permitted, I transferred them to my garden plot (#11).

Unfortunately, the flowers on my healthy plants fell to the ground leaving bare stamen. I became aware of the need for a refresher course in botany.

The sole purpose of the flower is to reproduce. Each part of the flower plays a role in the steps of reproduction. Some parts are sterile. Their beauty and character entice bees and others to the plant, aiding in the process. There are male gametes and female gamets. Both are directly involved with creating the next generation. All parts needed for reproduction are in a single flower. "Sexual reproduction"

Male flowers appear first in anticipation of the females!!. As gentlemen, the early male flowers do not rush the females. They fall off and die to allow the females time to become strong receptacles of the pollen which contain the sperm necessary for the creation of a seed which will become the next generation. Bees and other insects are the propagators of pollen from flower to flower. While bees are flying around the flowers collecting nectar, pollen grains containing sperm from the males stick to their feet and body. The female catches the pollen and delivers the sperm down a tube to the egg that is waiting to be fertilized. The fertized ovule becomes a seed which matures and forms the fruit, or future seeds.

A walk around Harrogate's grounds might now prove more interesting. Midge Kennedy

AVOCADO CRACK DIP

Ingredients

2 plum tomatoes, chopped

1/4 cup onion, chopped fine

1 bunch fresh parsley, chopped very fine

1 clove garlic, minced

1/2 tsp oregano

1 Tbsp olive oil

2 Tbsp red wine vinegar

4 oz plain crumbled feta cheese

salt and pepper to taste

2 avocados chopped in chunks

Instructions

In a bowl combine all ingredients except the avocados.

Stir to combine.

Cover and refrigerate for several hours or overnight.

Before serving add in avocados and stir.

Serve with tortilla chips.

To make vegan, leave out feta cheese

For gluten free, serve with gluten free rice crackers
