Birding

Our state bird, the Carolina Wren, is a year-round resident to the Low Country that loves to flitter about the shrubs and underbrush around our homes. The birds are easily identified. They are small but have round, chunky bodies. Their heads are round with a long, slender, and downcurved bill. Their backs

are brown and above their eyes is a white

eyebrow stripe. Below the bill is a white chin and throat.

The Carolina Wren flits through the underbrush looking for insects. They are real adventurers in choosing nest sites. Open garage doors are an invitation to construct domiciles on shelving intended for storage. The nests are constructed by both male and female with one bringing the building material and the other doing the assembly. Music is the matrimonial attraction that brings together the male and female to a life long relationship. The male's oratory is what attracts the female and the song, *teakettle, teakettle, teakettle,* is short lived, lasting but a few seconds. Males have a repertoire of about 15 songs. The females, apparently, are mute.

After the nestlings have fledged, the entire family of parents and fledglings forage together mostly on the ground looking for insects. With their downcurved beaks they flip over leaf litter looking for food and hammer and shake beetles to reduce them to appropriate dining morsels.

As a population Carolina Wrens are in fairly good shape with an estimated global population of 14 million. Almost 90% of the population live in the U.S. Over the past century these birds have extended northward in their range. This may be due to rising average winter temperatures.

A closing tidbit of state bird lore. In 1990, when a new SC

Vehicle license plate was introduced, bird lovers statewide were incensed to see the Carolina Wren's tail sticking straight back and not cocked up at 90 degrees as is the bird's customary pose. Much anguish was felt by the purists, but the State prevailed and left the tail as it was. Sigh.....

Hortículture



The Louisiana Iris from Savannah have been planted in The Reflection Garden, and look happy with the recent rain. Sasanqua camellias are gorgeous!

The farm is again holding sales on Saturday mornings through December featuring citrus, greens and delicious kumquat marmalade. Local honey may also be available.

Clean and bring in all houseplants for the winter. Finish planting trees and shrubs so they can establish healthy roots before cold weather. Mulch all tender plants and continue to water as needed. Dig caladium bulbs and some of your glads for staggered planting in the Spring. Plant amaryllis in pots of peaty soil for Christmas bloom. Plant bulbs at the end of the month. Rake and save pinestraw as it is the best mulch.



November's HEALTHY RECIPES from Anna Broecker



SEEDED CRUNCH BARS

1/4 cup chia seeds
1/4 cup hemp seeds
12 ounces milk chocolate chips (2 cups)
12 ounces semisweet chocolate chips (2 cups)
1 1/2 cups puffed rice cereal
1 teaspoon flaky sea salt



Line an 8 inch square baking dish with parchment paper. Mix chia and hemp seeds in a small bowl. Set aside 2 tbsp seed mixture for topping.

Microwave chocolate chips on high until melted, about 90 seconds, stopping to stir every

30 seconds. Let cool slightly. Gradually add seed mixture and cereal to melted chocolate, stirring until combined.

Spread mixture into prepared baking dish and smooth the top. Tap bottom of dish firmly on a surface a few times to release any air bubbles.

Top with salt and reserved 2 tbsp reserved seed mixture

Refrigerate until set, about 30 minutes. Let stand at room temperature for 10 minutes before slicing into 24 bars (about 2 1/2 by 1 inch each). Store tightly covered in the refrigerator for up to 2 weeks. Bring to room temperature before serving

***This is the original recipe from "Real Simple".

I changed the recipe to make even healthier. I used 24 ounces of dairy free chocolate chips instead of the above (Enjoy Life chocolate morsels available at Harris Teeter). Also I cut into smaller pieces, yield 48 pieces.

Makes a delicious healthy snack!
