It is listed on the National Register of Historic Places

Magnolia is the oldest plantation on the Ashley river (1676) and is still under the original family ownership-The Drayton family- now twelfth and thirteenth generation

Its majestic springtime display has been likened to the Grand Canyon and Niagara Falls

The Jr. Gardeners worked in the vegetable garden (weeding, watering, and harvesting red lettuce and cabbages) and then had an Easter party with fruit kabobs, bunny cupcakes, and Easter eggs filled with chocolates. Next, they created cards and planted a variety of flower seeds into biodegradable egg cartons to take home as gifts to their parents. They were given printed instructions on how to care for the seedlings and when to transplant them into their home gardens. Nadine Korosi, Ann Clayton, and Sandy Stern worked with parent volunteer, Beth Cooler and club teacher, Ms. Jackson on these activities.













#### **SNACK BREAD** (Ranch cream cheese cucumber ryes)

- 8 oz light cream cheese
- 1 package ranch dressing mix (dry)
- 1 loaf cocktail rye bread slices
- 1 seedless cucumber -- peeled and sliced

Sprig fresh dill (or dill weed)

- 1. Mix cream cheese and ranch dressing mix until well blended
- 2. Spread on cocktail rye bread slices
- 3. Place 1 or 2 slices of cucumber, peeled, scored on the side with a fork, well blotted with paper towel for excess moisture, on top of each slice of bread
- 4. Place sprig of fresh dill on top (or sprinkle with dill weed)



# All Saints Garden Tour

Purchase your tickets now for the 32<sup>nd</sup> **All Saints Garden Tour on Saturday, May 18, 2019** from 10am-4pm. The 2019 self-guided tour features seven private gardens, four on Hilton Head Island and three in Bluffton, SC and will provide inspiration for gardeners at all levels.

Each garden is unique- the majority feature water in a variety of ways including marshes, lagoons and a river setting- all providing a stunning backdrop for the garden. Several gardens are beautifully restored from the major damages caused by recent storms. There are unique features in some of the gardens- one has skillfully blended over 150 different specimen plants into the landscape, while another features Native plants. Several of the gardens are designed for relaxing, perfect for retreating. A Charleston inspired garden features a formal courtyard in the front and garden rooms for recreation and entertaining in the back. All the gardens provide tranquil settings to enjoy nature and the beauty that drew many of us to the Lowcountry.

In addition to the tour, lunch is included in the ticket price and is served in the All Saints Episcopal Church social hall from 11:00-2:00. Also at the church you will find a boutique with lovely items made by local artisans; a bake sale of delicious home make confections; a booth of pottery produced and for sale by the students at Programs for Exceptional People (PEP); master gardeners available to answer questions; and a display of landscape items offered by Taylors Quality Landscape Supply & Nursery.

All net proceeds from the Tour are donated to local charities. 2019 grant recipients are BackPack Buddies of Bluffton, Backpack Buddies of Hilton Head Island, Jasper County Backpack Buddies, The Literacy Center, Hilton Head Island Safe Harbour, and St. Stephens United Methodist Church Outreach Foodbank. Over the years, more than a half million dollars have been given to local charities from this Garden Tour bringing truth to our logo "Through the Beauty of a Garden ..... A Gift to the Community". All who attend the 2019 Garden Tour add to this legacy.

## Horticulture...

This is the time to really enjoy your garden as you finish up planting and begin weeding in earnest. Feed Spring

flowering bulbs with a balanced fertilizer to promote next year's blooms, and do not cut off any leaves until they turn brown. Take photos of them to note where you want to plant more this Fall. Start your hanging baskets keeping them higher than deer can reach or go shopping for them at one of our excellent nurseries. You can 'Google' all of them online.

Take your houseplants outside for the summer when the temperature is the same as indoors. Mulch everything with three inches of mulch to conserve moisture and help prevent new weeds. Keep mulch away from stems and trunks. Pick off and discard any leaf galls on azaleas. I have found a few this year. Clean up any fallen camellias and use new mulch under them. Magnolias need this also.

The loquats are so loaded with fruit now that I have had to prune them to keep the branches from breaking. They are delicious but hardly worth the effort it takes to make jelly


# Birding George Westerfield

Read no further if your refined sensibilities exceed your interest in birds. This issue's topic is far from the varicolored painted bunting or the beautiful wood duck. Let's meet the garbage disposal unit of the avian world...the turkey vulture. Yes, this is the black feathered, red-headed flapper you see roadside dining on the remains of Bambi, her mom, or a slow-witted armadillo. All creatures find their niche and these winged wonders have gone where others have declined to be.

Turkey vultures (Cathartes aura) are one of two species of vultures to grace our skies. The other is the black vulture (Coragyps atratus), a bit smaller than the Turkey vulture. The Turkey vulture in search of a meal soars above the earth rocking back and forth on wings in a flattened V. With extraordinary eyesight and acute smelling ability these birds can find a fresh meal of their liking. They, along with their hungry companions, reduce to bones the deceased animals. This is a boon for us and should be recognized as such. These birds remove that which would be a noisome task for you and me.

In reflecting on these birds, I hope that you put aside your delicate sensibilities at least briefly to appreciate the wondrous world in which we live.
