
## Celebrating Our 35th year

Membership dues are due By May 31



## Birding.....Beth Hommes

#### **Osprey**

The osprey is a cool bird that migrates to and from our area. They are a type of hawk who generally live fifteen to twenty years. They may fly up to 8000 miles per year to migrate. Much of the mortality within osprey populations occurs during migration.

They usually mate for life. Pairs of osprey return to the same areas yearly. They build their nests of sticks on high platforms. They will use duck blinds, channel markers, and other manmade structures as bases. There is one platform on Squire Pope Road near the parking lot for Hudsons and another in the field at the Coastal Discovery Museum. Both of these have had ospreys return to them in recent weeks.



Coastal Discovery built another platform for them nearer the marsh but no birds ever used it. The museum later found out that osprey will not nest unless they have 360 degree visibility around the nest so that they can protect hatched chicks. The museum platform did not have enough clearance to provide this.

Ospreys are larger than a red-tailed hawk but smaller than a bald eagle. They are dark brown on top and mainly white on the bottom.



Ospreys live near water—saltwater marshes, estuaries, rivers, and ponds. They eat fish. They circle shallow water looking for food. They have superior vision for seeing underwater from the air. They are great divers and may catch a fish on between 25 and 70 percent of their dives. Barbs on the soles of their feet help them to grasp their prey and be able to fly while holding it. They can close their nostrils

when they dive and their dense, oily feathers don't get waterlogged.

Ospreys lay a clutch of two to four eggs which they incubate for five to six weeks. Unlike many other birds, these eggs do not all hatch at the same time. Eggs hatch over five days. The first to hatch becomes the dominant chick and if food is scarce the younger birds may starve. The juveniles will leave the nest in about eight to 10 weeks.

Osprey numbers used to be low but since the prohibitions on DDT and other pesticides, their populations have grown dramatically. They are now considered of least concern by conservationists.

# School Garden Program.....Sandy Stern

A team of eight TAG volunteers has been working at the HHI School for the Creative Arts in the courtyard gardens over the past few months to re-establish the Butterfly Garden and the Korosi Vegetable Garden.

Fruit trees have been planted, trees and shrubs have been pruned, 4 vegetable raised beds were weeded and covered in tarp in preparation of plantings in the fall semester. Mulch was placed in the butterfly garden along with flowering plants and a new bird bath.

We're making progress, but there's lots more to do, so we plan to work over the summer months to get things ready for the startup of the after-school JR. GARDEN CLUB in September.
