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Garden Chores for April

This is the best time to plant flowering annuals. The stores are overflowing with them

<u>Annuals:</u> I like to use root starting hormone on my annuals. This comes as a powder but is now also available in liquid (concentrate) form. Bonide Root & Grow Plant Starter, which is easier to use, can be used as a pre-planting soak. I also incorporate a systemic deer repellant (Repellex tablets), and some Vermiculite, in the planting hole. Gardening is personal. See what works for you.

<u>Perennials:</u> are an investment. They take time to get established (typically around 3 years). Be patient, don't plant too close. With the exception of Tropicals, perennials are best planted in the fall in our climate.

Tropicals: are best planted this time of year, as opposed to in the fall (their worst enemy is frost, not heat).

Prune

Azaleas and other spring flowering shrubs can be pruned after they have finished blooming.

Fertilize

Note the N-P-K ratio listed on every fertilizer:

N stands for Nitrogen, which promotes leafy growth.

P stands for Phosphorus, which stimulates fruit, root, and flower production.

K stands for Potassium, which improves drought tolerance, disease resistance & durability.

Nitrogen fertilizer is best applied as a slow-release fertilizer, or as a spray. Applying too much can burn a plant.

If you have not fertilized your azalea yet, you must do so now. Use a special Azalea/Camelia fertilizer.

Gardenias will develop yellow leaves at this time of year. Yellowing of many <u>older</u> leaves is often a sign of insufficient nitrogen or magnesium. <u>Young</u> gardenia leaves turning yellow is likely from low iron. Magnesium insufficiency can be cured by an application of (non-smalling) Epsom salts. Iron defiency can be treated by an application of iron (lawn sprayer).

Use a specialty bulb fertilizer (low N) on your bulbs (Amaryllis, Calla Lilies, Irises, Spanish Hyacynths, Butterfly gingers). Using a fertilizer with too much Nitrogen will promote lush green leafy growth but fewer flowers.

Blooming tropical plants that are heavy feeders (e.g. Strelizia) can be fertilized with citrus fertilizer spikes (9-12-12).

Use an 'all-purpose' fertilizer on all your other plants at this time.

You can supplement with a water hose application of bloombooster on <u>plants that are in bloom</u> if you have sandy soil. use liquid bloom booster, such as Miracle-Gro garden hose spray (works great on annuals).

Do not fertilize newly planted shrubs and trees; without an established root system this does more harm

Irrigation

April normally brings with it a few warmer days, and it may be tempting to turn the irrigation on to make sure plants and turf are getting enough water, but try to remain conservative with irrigation. Too much water at the wrong times may cause problems in the landscape.

While it is important not to overwater in early spring, April can be a good time to inspect irrigation systems to make sure they are working properly for the growing season.

Blooming in April

Loropetelum. Japanese naples have flushed out and have their colorful leaves.

Daffodils (Thalia), Spanish Bluebells (Hyacinthoides hispanica), Large (perennial) Calla Lily (Zantedeschia *aethiopica*), Snap Dragons, Dianthus, Stock flowers (Matthiola *incana*), Iris Ampliflora 'Ming Treasure' (above), Strelizia Regina.



Coastal Georgia Botanical Gardens' River of Irises typically blooms from now (Mid April) to the end of the month. Hundreds of Louisiana iris varieties populate the low-lying gullies that help drain excess moisture from the garden After a heavy rain, slow-moving water flows through the iris plants in picturesque, gently winding rivers.

The 51-acre garden, (not be be confused with the much older, and smaller, Savannah Botanical Garden located in the center of Savannah), is located near Savannah airport.
