In January we had unusually cold temperatures and the added snow/ice that may have affected your plants. Our last official frost date is March 9<sup>th</sup> according to the almanac for our area. Being patient is the key – allow leaves to remain on plants for now and evaluate their health over the next few weeks. Hold off on fertilizing and pruning damaged plants until the beginning of March. Leave the damaged (blackened) perennial foliage in place for a bit longer and you may be surprised to see new growth appear!

Spring is right around the corner, and we should all be glad that the cold isn't here to stay!
